Assignment 8-1

Acts 1: 7-8

⁷ He said to them, “It is not for you to know times or seasons that the Father has fixed by his own authority. ⁸ But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth.”

In this section on scripture we see Jesus addressing his disciples. By reading the surrounding verses, we can learn the following:

- It takes place after his resurrection (v3)
- They were in Jerusalem (v4)
- Jesus is responding to a question from the disciples about whether now is the time for the kingdom to be restored (v6)
- It occurs right before Jesus is taken up into a cloud, out of their sight (v9)

1 Corinthians 11: 27-32

²⁷ Whoever, therefore, eats the bread or drinks the cup of the Lord in an unworthy manner will be guilty concerning the body and blood of the Lord. ²⁸ Let a person examine himself, then, and so eat of the bread and drink of the cup. ²⁹ For anyone who eats and drinks without discerning the body eats and drinks judgment on himself. ³⁰ That is why many of you are weak and ill, and some have died. ³¹ But if we judged ourselves truly, we would not be judged. ³² But when we are judged by the Lord, we are disciplined so that we may not be condemned along with the world.

In this section of scripture, we see Paul addressing the Corinthians about eating and drinking from the Lords cup, and the consequences of doing it in an unworthy manner. Telling them to not do it in an unworthy manner, but to ensure you are discerning when doing so.

When we read the surrounding versus, we should start from the beginning of chapter 11, as Paul starts a new thought. He begins talking about physical things within the church, commending and correcting them on the topic and tradition of head coverings in the church.

Then in verse 17 he moves to correct them regarding another teaching he has already brought them, on the Lords Supper.

In verse 23, Paul tells how he passed on what he knows about the night when Jesus was betrayed and his actions with the bread and the wine, and how he wants the Corinthians to follow that. But instead they have made it into a meal and are not looking after one another, letting some go hungry and not caring for each other. So Paul reframes it for them, telling them to be thoughtful towards what they are doing and why they are there, the symbolism of the bread and the wine.

He follows up in verses 33-34 that the simplest solution is that if you want to eat, eat beforehand, so that the bread and the wine may remain as what it is, and they do not continue to bring judgement on themselves.
